The book investigates the impulse behind civic duty in democracies. Why do some citizens feel a sense of responsibility to vote, pay taxes, take up arms, and otherwise sacrifice for their democracies? Through a comparison of South Korea, Taiwan, and democratic societies elsewhere, I show that civic duty is surprisingly rooted in a force long thought to be detrimental to democracy: strong national attachments.
